

Work At New Milford Plant Progressing On Schedule



The largest unit to be installed in the New Milford mill is this most modern drawbench which is 479 feet long and which can produce copper tubes 200 feet long from an original length of 12 feet. It is pictured in two sections. Tubes are loaded on the side of the bench opposite the operator's control panel (arrow) in the picture on the left. From here they are threaded into mandrel rods through



the set of feed rolls shown

From that point they are drawn two, three, or even five at a time at speeds up to 400 feet per minute and disposed of on the far side of the bench shown in the right-hand photo. That is for one drawing. This cycle is repeated for as many draws as may be required.

Woodtick Opens On Memorial Day

Friday, May 30, Memorial Day, will mark the official opening of the Woodtick Recreation area for its 13th season. Employees of the Waterbury, Waterville and Oakville Divisions, together with their families and friends will enjoy again recreational facilities which are the best available in the locale, at a nominal price.

about June 1st. All of the new benches are erected, wired and cycled out; the new muffles are about 95% installed and will be fired any day now; two sets of pickle tubs are installed; new pointers, saws and straighteners are being installed and wired.

If present schedules are maintained, it is planned to send some operators to New Milford during the month of June. Those involved will be notified as far in advance as possible.

Once the equipment is in satisfactory operation, the Waterbury Mill will be closed down — this is expected to be sometime in the summer. The equipment now in the Waterbury Mill then will be dismantled, moved to New Milford to be set up and operated.

Barring any unforseen problems, those now in Waterbury but wishing to transfer to New Milford, can be working there by early winter.

Fringe Benefits

In general the term Fringe Benefits applies to three types of payments. First there is pay for no work, such as pay for holidays not worked, vacation pay, Blue Cross, etc.

And then there is extra pay for no additional production, such as overtime and shift bonus.

The third group of payments are required by law, such as Workman's Compensation and Social Security Tax.

We may think of Fringe Benefits as something incidental, but that is far from the case. The last survey we made showed that fringe benefits averaged to cost the Company 67 cents for each hour worked by each employee. This is on top of the high hourly earnings of employees.

67 cents per hour is more than the hourly rate of a large proportion of the employees of our foreign competitors. High wages and high fringe benefits are fine. A job is not only fine, but necessary. Are we pricing ourselves out of jobs?

Are Your Pans Well Stacked?

The positioning of empty pans or baskets — particularly the *bottom row* —is most important.

Empty pans appear one by one and each is stacked as received. A very simple process and easily taken care of. However, when ready for moving, two dangers may have been built up—as posed in our picture:—

1) Notice how the first row of pans has been stacked — the pans 'hang over' the skid, putting them in the way of the skidjack and the whole pile in a position to fall.

2) Notice how high the pile has

2) Notice how high the pile has been stacked. Such "too high" stacking has been responsible for many disabling injuries caused when pans so stacked fell on the man moving skid.

Remember — when loading pans — build carefully from the bottom up and stop stacking when the load is shoulder high.

And watch that first — or bottom — pan. Its proper placement will determine how the stack is built up.

For safety's sake (and your own) keep your pans well stacked!




Joseph Charette, Dept. 84, appears skeptical as he views this posed stacking of pans. He clearly sees two possibilities of injury and damage. Can you?


