

# Pre-Retirement Program

The "Looking Forward to Retirement" program will be resumed in September for its tenth year of retirement planning sessions.

First started in 1964, the program is co-sponsored by the Company and the Union, and is offered to employees and their spouses.

Especially prepared for employees 55 years of age and over, the program provides authentic and dependable information needed to confidently plan and prepare for the leisure years.

Many have voiced surprise on learning of subjects which should be planned for — legal matters which should be considered are brought to their attention by a lawyer — maintaining good health and health services available to the retired are discussed by a doctor — budget planning and proper diet are covered by a professional nutritionist — recreational outlets are presented by a librarian and a representative of the Retired

Workers Council — social security is discussed with a representative of the local Social Security office — living arrangements, family relationships, etc. are all discussed.

A two-hour session (from 2 to 4 p.m.) is held once each week, on Wednesdays, for eight weeks. One hour is paid for by the Company, the other is on the employee's own time.

Group units are now being set up for the fall sessions. Interested employees are invited to register. Assignments to the group must take into consideration departmental needs. It may not be possible to assign more than one employee from the same shift in one department as this could interfere with production requirements.

# MEMO from Management:

# Describing Scovill

Scovill. A short name but covering a great variety of products sold in major consumer and industrial markets. A company with such well-known brand names as Hamilton Beach, Dominion, NuTone, Dritz, Gripper, Schrader . . . Approximately 20,000 employees in plants and offices across the country and around the world. One of the 500 largest industrial companies in the country with annual sales of over 500 million dollars. Uninterrupted dividends since 1856—117 years—the best record of any manufacturer on the New York Stock Exchange.

How do you boil all of this down to just a few words? We are often asked by news sources to give them a description of Scovill in just one short sentence. It isn't easy, particularly because of our increasing diversity in products and markets. But here is a "one sentencer" that we sometimes use:—

"Scovill is a widely diversified manufacturer of housing products, sewing notions and apparel fasteners, housewares, metals and industrial products."

Well, it is only one sentence, but it doesn't make you jump up and down with excitement. We would still like to get the message across that we produce products with such familiar names as Hamilton Beach, NuTone, Gripper, Dritz and Schrader.

Probably one of the most useful tools that we have developed to show who we are and what we do is a table in our Annual Report that breaks down the sales and earnings of our five major product groups. For example, the table in our last report shows that 31.5% of our 1972 sales come from our housing products group, 13.5% from housewares, 18.9% from sewing notions and apparel fasteners, 22.1% from metals and industrial products, and 14% from automotive and fluid power products.

Scovill has come a long way in the past few years. Our business has just about doubled since 1965. Housing products, a new market which we entered with the NuTone acquisition in 1967, is now our largest single business. Today, we have a strong position in major consumer and industrial markets—markets which should continue to offer attractive growth opportunities to those companies smart enough and aggressive enough to take advantage of them. It's pretty difficult to wrap all of this up into one descriptive sentence. But, we'll keep trying.



# Hypertension —

Recent surveys of apparently normal adults have revealed that up to 30% of those tested have hypertension. Non-medical people know this diagnosis as "high blood pressure".

The significance of this finding is that doctors know that people with "high blood pressure" are more likely to develop heart problems and strokes. It is also well known that uncontrolled hypertension may lead to earlier death because of these secondary diseases.

Hypertension, however, is controllable today with proper medications, surgery, dietary restrictions and common sense. The tragedy is that, being reasonably asymptomatic, patients are not inclined to follow the regimen established for them by their doctors. They "forget" to take their pills. The diet requires discipline. So we find them uncontrolled and in jeopardy.

Our advice for August — If you find you have high blood pressure, see your doctor, follow his advice, live longer more comfortably. Common sense is better than neglect.


