## Treasury Award to Scovill Bond Buyers

Scovill President John C. Helies shares with Editor Margaret Fenske and Local 1604 President Tom Curtin the award certificate presented by the U.S. Treasury Dept. in recognition of employee participation in the Payroll Savings Plan for the purchase of U.S. Savings Bonds.

Prominently displayed in the Employment Department is the latest award presented to Scovill employees. It was given by the U.S. Treasury Dept. for the over 50% participation of employees in the purchase of U.S. Savings Bonds through payroll deductions.

The 1974 Management-Labor drive conducted in the plant resulted in 67.3% participation by employees—topping their 1973 rate of 64.1%.

Reports to date indicate that four

other Scovill locations went over the 50% participation mark and have received citations from the U.S. Treasury Dept. in recognition thereof.

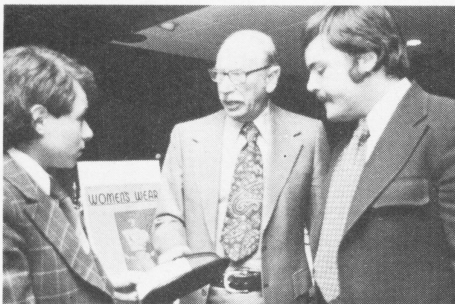

# MEMO *from Management:*

## Don't Let the GNP Scare You

The continuing decline in the Gross National Product is certainly cause for concern but, to put things in their proper perspective, Iron Age magazine recently ran an editorial with the above title.

The editorial recognized the serious problems faced by so many companies and the prevalence of gloomy forecasts that conditions could get worse before they get better. It then had the following comments on the accuracy of the forecasts that so many economists were making last year at this time.

"First of all, at this time last year the overwhelming economic consensus was that business would slow down in the first half of 1974 and pick up strongly in the second half.

"What happened? Business roared through the first half and took a dive in the second.

"That's really missing it. But it did sound pretty convincing to most businessmen at the time.

"Now for the next wrongo.

"Not one, yes, not one major economic forecasting source foresaw the double-digit inflation of this year and last.

"Now, zero out of two on such a grand scale just ain't good.

"And anybody who lets the current bag of forecasts shake them up badly is probably making just as big a mistake."

Wishful thinking alone won't solve our current economic problems. But neither will excess gloom or pessimism. As Iron Age concludes in its editorial, the best course of action is to strengthen our determination to make things come out right for our own Company.

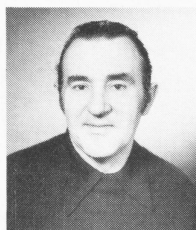
## Caution -- Speed Limit

Now that the 55-mile-an-hour speed limit has been made permanent—no matter what you might hear, don't count on police winking at speeders.

A U.S. Dept. of Transportation survey shows that the number of traffic tickets issued by State highway patrols went up in 1974 (except in Georgia) when the lower limit was first imposed.

Connecticut was one of the 11 states where tickets issued after the 55-mile limit went into effect were more than double the number issued before.
