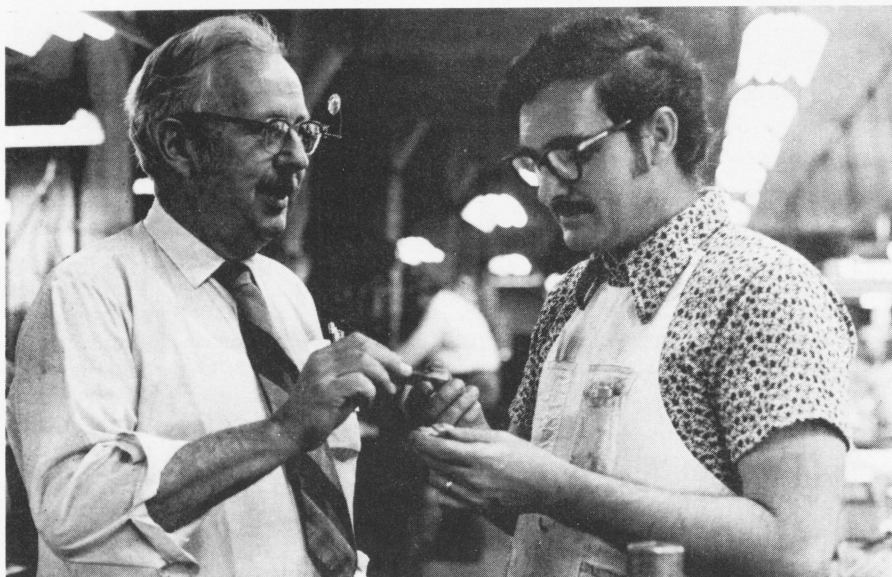

MEMO

from Management:

First Quarter Results

Our recently released financial report for the first quarter of this year shows that profits after taxes of \$3,589,133 were down about 24 per cent from the \$4,557,913 reported in the same period last year. Sales of \$162,219,438 were up 10 per cent over last year's first quarter. The lower first quarter earnings were due mainly to the delay in recovering rapidly escalating costs of doing business under Phase IV price controls.

At the Annual Meeting of Stockholders held in Waterbury on April 15th, Chairman Malcolm Baldrige gave some specific examples of the cost increases responsible for lower first quarter earnings. He noted that the price of copper, which had risen from 51 cents per pound on January 1, 1973 to 95 cents a pound at the end of 1973, continued to increase and reached a high of \$1.35 a pound by the end of the first quarter. This rapid escalation in costs has been eroding profit margins in our brass mill business at a time when we are shipping high volumes and have a healthy backlog.

The effect of these high copper prices in the first quarter was not confined to our brass mill business, Mr. Baldrige continued. Profit margins have also been reduced in such other lines as tire valves, apparel fasteners and sewing notions, all of which use brass in some of their principal products and have been having the same problem in recovering these higher costs.

Other material costs have also risen, he noted. A good example is the various forms of plastic used in such items as housings for Hamilton Beach appliances, in zippers, and in garment bags. These plastics have not only been in short supply but have also increased in price anywhere from 15 per cent to 40 per cent in the last six months. The Dritz line of sewing accessories has also been seriously affected. About 35 per cent of this line is imported, and some items have increased in cost as much as 50 per cent.

No predictions were made at the Annual Meeting concerning Company earnings for the balance of the year due to the many uncertainties that now exist as to what will happen to costs and prices when price controls are terminated on April 30th.

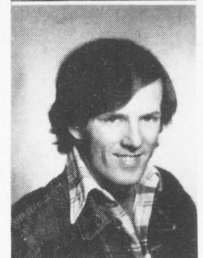

"Work-Study" Students Attend Annual Meeting

Getting first-hand information from President John C. Helies on how companies operate are Wilby High School students Francis Pronovost, Cindy Hoft, Tammy Duffy and Richard Dorais. They attended the Company's annual meeting in conjunction with their on-the-job training program.

Scovill is one of several local employers who have joined in a Cooperative Vocational Education Program established by the Waterbury School System wherein public high school students are afforded an opportunity to put into practice the skills they gain in the classroom.

During the past year, Scovill has provided the program with six jobs and, since the students alternate every three weeks, this means that twelve students are presently being offered a vocational opportunity.

Under this "Cooperative-Work-Experience" (C.W.E.) arrangement between the schools and employers, participating students receive systematic organized on-the-job training and related vocational instructions, by alternating study in school with on-the-job training in a chosen occupational field. The two experiences are planned and supervised by the school and the employer, so that each contributes to the student's education and employability.

The program requires that students work three weeks, and then attend classes for a similar period. These alternating "Work-Study" arrangements are continued during the school year. Students thus have an opportunity to learn skills on real jobs under actual working conditions.

The program invites them to seek education for developing their personal needs. With the ultimate goal of these students being placed into suitable jobs.

In addition, it affords some an opportunity to earn money and thus to be able to remain in school.

All students in the program are selected from the Junior Class and are retained for two years in the program provided they meet all of the established requirements.

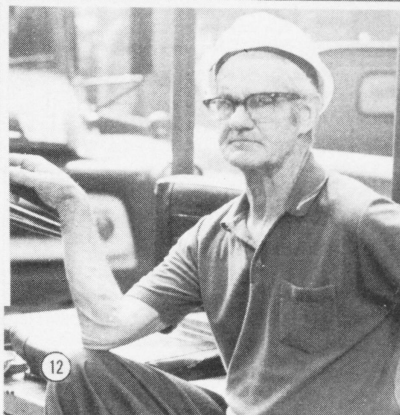
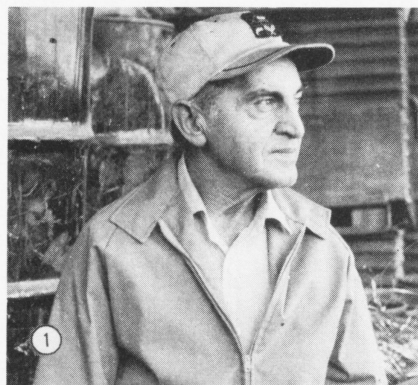

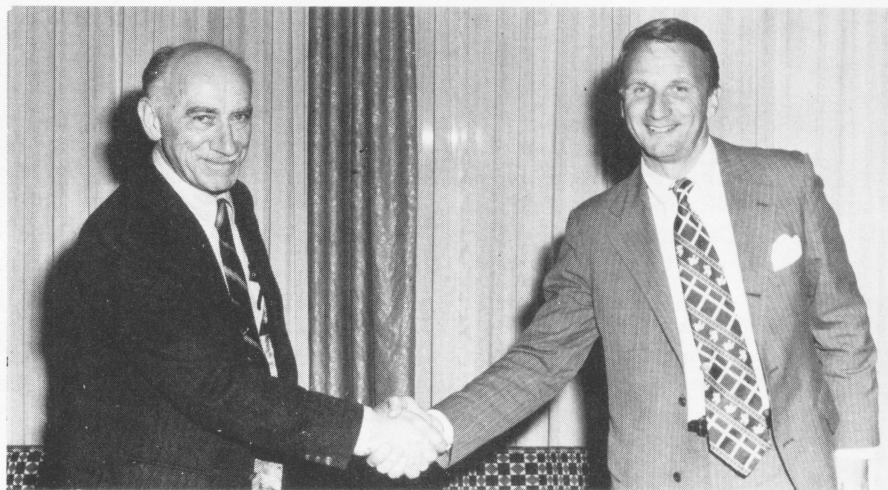

Fishing Rules and Regulations

To insure continued enjoyment in fishing and to provide better facilities and comforts for Scovill employees, their families and guests who fish at Woodtick Reservoir, cooperation is asked in observing all rules and regulations, and to exercise good sportsmanship at all times.

Fishing is by permit only. Any Scovill employee may obtain a permit from the caretaker at Woodtick Reservoir (50¢ per day, or \$3.00 per season). Connecticut fishing license must accompany permit.

Children under 16 years of age do not need a permit to fish, but must be accompanied at all times by a permit-holding adult.

Scovill employees *only* may bring not over two guests per day. Employee must obtain a permit for each guest.

Fishing is *not* permitted from the dock, the dam or from any shore other than that in the posted area from the dam to the end of the dike.

Daily creel limits and legal lengths will be according to Connecticut Dept. of Environmental Protection Regulations, unless otherwise posted at the dock.

Boat rental is on a first-come, first-served basis, at 50¢ per day, per person. Not over 3 persons per boat, one of whom must be over 18 years of age. In order to comply with the State Boating laws, buoyant cushions will be issued with each permit. A deposit of \$1.00 per cushion will be required and refunded upon return of cushion.

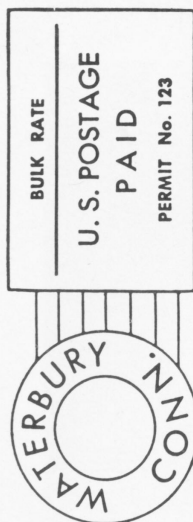


An all-out search for softball players has begun. Anyone interested in playing is asked to call the Employee Activities Office, Ext. 837.

You'll all be off on vacation soon—have a fine time—play it safe—and, if you have any interesting items for this column, be sure to call Ext. 837 when you return.



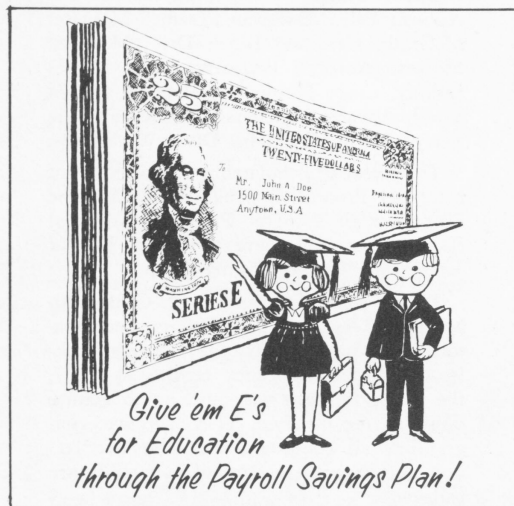
