## MEMO from Management:

## **Enjoy Your Retirement**

(Editor's Note:— the following editorial by Don Oakley of the Newspaper Enterprise Association is appearing in hundreds of newspapers across the nation. Because of its timeliness and the fact that it is Scovill employees who made our "Looking Forward to Retirement" program such a success, we feel all employees can take pride in knowing that their program is being used by the State and other companies throughout the country as the pattern for setting up their own programs.)

It's possible to take lessons in almost anything nowadays, from painting to preserving peaches to playing a recorder (the ancient musical instrument).

Name it and someone in the community can teach you, often with no tuition.

There is one notable exception: Virtually no one gives a course in how to prepare for living in retirement.

Many retirees discover they don't know what to do with the never-ending days they suddenly have stretching ahead of them.

Not having to get up every morning to go to work loses its appeal after a couple of weeks. Rare is the man who can happily spend his time doing nothing, or playing golf or fishing — or getting under his wife's feet.

When enforced leisure becomes the reality and not the dream, boredom and depression often set in.

One state is doing something about this problem.

Early this summer, Connecticut established an Office of Pre-Retirement Education, believed to be the first in the country.

Funded with \$50,000, it will develop a program to ease the way into retirement, modeled after a successful preretirement program conducted since 1964 by Scovill Manufacturing Company in Waterbury and Local 1604 of the United Auto Workers.

Hundreds of employees of this diversified manufacturer and their spouses have completed the eight-session course in which, with the help of trained leaders, they explored such topics as health, financial planning, leisure, Social Security, Medicare, legal problems, living arrangements and nutrition.

The new state program will cover much the same ground.

None of these concerns is unique to Connecticut, of course. Thus, its pre-retirement education program could become a model for other states.

## Connecticut's First C.M.A

Malcolm S. Todt, Manager — Cash and Banking, has been awarded a Certificate in Management Accounting by the Institute of Management Accounting of the National Association of Accountants.


By passing the five-part examination and meeting the educational and professional requirements of the Credentials Committee, he becomes the first Certified Management Accountant in Connecticut, and one of only two in New England.

The two and one-half day written examination was offered for the first time by the Institute in December, 1972, with over 400 in the United States sitting for one or all of the five parts. The Institute states that the C.M.A. program is designed to enhance the professional status of the management accountant. Its objectives include the identification of the body of knowledge important to management accounting and the recognition of the individual management accountant.

Mr. Todt joined Scovill as a financial analyst in 1968 after graduating Magna Cum Laude from Babson College with his Master's degree in Businéss. In 1970, he became controller of Dominion Electric Corp. (a Scovill subsidiary in Mansfield, Ohio). He returned to Waterbury in early 1972 where he is responsible for corporate cash management transactions, cash mobilization programs and banking and bank account relations as well as being involved with other Treasury Dept. functions as assigned, including Working Capital and Capital Appropriation control programs.


